Work or Fun?



Prepping a 1999 Mazda Miata for SCCA Spec Miata requires a variety of mechanical skills, patience, and money. Throughout the past fours years the amount of prep work required to be a front-runner in SCCA's secondmost popular class has steadily been increasing. More prep work means more time, parts, and of course, money.

I am not a front-runner in spec miata, but I am in that "second group" of also-rans. Whether I'm racing at ORP, Nelson Ledges, GingerMan, Grattan, or Road America, I find myself not being able to contend with the front-runners. This can be contributed to car prep and driver skill (or lack thereof).

Typical race prep for me includes: aligning the car(camber, toe, and castor), scaling the car by getting a 50% cross-weight, blueprinting the front hubs, changing differential, transmission and crankcase fluids, changing spark plugs, and checking the brakes. Some of these items are done before every race, while others are attended to every other race. I'm not sure what the front-runners are doing, but I imagine it's quite a bit more. I really can't be sure though because there's a lot of "secret" stuff going on that no-body really talks about.

After acquiring a data acquisition system in 2009, I found that it's time to improve my driving skills. More specifically, my braking skills. I can hit apexes, drive the correct line and accelerate out of corners with the best of them. But, the data showed that I need to drive deeper into corners and brake later, a lot later. By overlaying my data with that of other drivers, it became crystal clear that my car could go deeper into corners and was losing as much as 0.30 seconds on each of Road America's slower corners(1,3,5,8 and 12) Do the math, that's 1.5 seconds a lap just in braking. Believe me, the data doesn't lie.

So, here it is in the middle of August and I am contemplating my attendance at the SCCA Runoffs at Road America held in the middle of September. After testing leakdown in my engine, it looks like I'll need some work done of the cylinder head(\$). Other items that need attending too are; new batteries for the incar radios(\$), new racing gloves to replace gloves with a hole(\$), get fuel injectors matched and blue-printed(\$), make the car pretty again after a rough race at Grattan(\$, but more time).

I love the competition and the people involved in racing. Where else can a 44 year old teacher get an adrenaline rush like you get when racing side by side with two, three or four other race cars at over a hundred miles per hour? Yep, it's a lot of work getting ready to race, but it's worth it.

have tendonitis in my right elbow.
